Matthews: Jacko, I've been opinionated all my life, without doubt. Jacko: So has this worked against you?

Matthews: Certainly. I think it was Geoff Lawson who said that not everyone enjoys honesty, not everyone copes with it well. But-you've got to give a bit of yourself, you've got to be prepared to back yourself.
